The Gift of Music

If you walk past the Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church campus around 6:30pm on a Wednesday evening, you're bound to hear a lot of noise.

Down in the gym you'll hear excited voices chattering about science, technology, engineering, and mathematics as our students attempt to win the weekly STEM Challenge (eg: Who can build the tallest structure out of 50 straws and tape that can hold on orange on top?). Upstairs, you'll hear adult English Language Learners repeating new phrases after their teachers at the International Rescue Committee's English/Civics classes. Walk past the chapel, though, and you'll hear a sound you might not expect – the sound of drums.

Peak inside and you'll see a small group of Inspire students, drumsticks in hand, listening intently to Ms. Annika as she demonstrates a paradiddle drum stroke. Students focus hard and then try to repeat the stroke on the snare drums in front of each of them. It is a noisy endeavor, to say the least. But the students love it.

Annika Thesing, known to our students as Ms. Annika, is an 11th grader at Greater Atlanta Christian School and a snare drum player in the marching band. On Wednesdays Annika shows up to Inspire carrying a bag full of drumsticks and an excitement to share her love of music with our students: "Before I started teaching music at Inspire, I heard the kids talking about how they either don't do anything in music class at school, or don't have one. That's what made me want to teach them in ways that aren't like any boring music class they may have at school. I'm excited

that the kids will be able to see that learning music is fun and cause them to maybe be interested and pursue it too."

Every now and then Ms. Annika will demonstrate an elaborate cadence she plays in marching band - an event that leaves students with gaping mouths as they are astounded by her drum skills. Annika explains, "The kids love asking me the question, 'How did you get so good?' I love that question for the sole reason of being able to show them how their classes and practice is how to 'get so good.' Whenever they play something better than the week before, I remind them of how their practice is paying off!"

On Friday November 6th, twelve Inspire students and six chaperones took a **field trip** to watch Ms. Annika and her marching band in action at the Greater Atlanta Christian School Spartans football game. It was a nail-biter of a game in which the Spartans ("our team" as our students began to call it) made a game-winning touchdown in the last seconds against their rivals – the Wesleyan Wolves. Our students enjoyed learning about the game of football, and they excitedly put on rain ponchos when the mist began to fall. But the highlight of the night was watching the Spartan Marching Band out on the field during half time. "There's Ms. Annika!!!" they shouted, pointing excitedly as she swept across the field, accenting the tune of *Phantom of the Opera* with the stroke of her snare.

During the third quarter, Ms. Annika invited our students down to the marching band section of the stands. Students looked at giant tubas, met other band members, and played Ms. Annika's snare drum. A few students even got to try it on – and were impressed that Ms. Annika was strong enough to carry it around so long!

At Inspire we offer academic support to our students that they likely can't access elsewhere. But we offer them much more than that: we help expand their minds, interests, and hobbies; we expand their opportunities; and we teach them that learning can be fun. As Ms. Annika aptly explains, "Music, or any form of art, in my opinion is essential for anyone. Art is the way to express yourselves without rules and frustration for not doing something 'right.' Yes, I teach the kids the proper ways to play certain patterns and dynamics, but in the end they are expressing themselves. That's why at the end of every lesson, I let the kids each have solo time to play whatever they want and get all the stresses of life out by producing music. I think, and hope, that the kids will get something out of learning music. If not a love of music, then seeing how learning can be fun and expressive!"

Thanks to the generosity of Ms. Annika, all of our volunteers, and our donors, Inspire continues to make a difference in the lives of the youth in Clarkston.


