Bana Wins "Creating a Safer DeKalb" Essay Contest

What would you do to make your community safer?
Why? How would you get it done?

Last fall, the Solicitor-General's Office invited all DeKalb County 8th graders to participate in an essay contest answering those questions. The contest was entitled "Creating a Safer DeKalb." Bana, an 8th grader from Eritrea, was one of several Inspire students encouraged by their Language Arts teacher to submit an essay.

Bana worked on her essay at afterschool with the help of one of Inspire's volunteers, Tracy. During homework time, Bana, Tracy, and another student brainstormed together ways to make Clarkston a safer place. Bana developed several ideas to make Clarkston better: install security cameras around apartment complexes and outside each home's front door so the person inside can see who is knocking at the door; prohibit the sale of guns at all stores; and allow only security and police to carry guns.

Like most middle schoolers, Inspire students are learning how to write well. Tracy used this opportunity to push Bana and teach her about good writing: "I thought it was a great learning experience

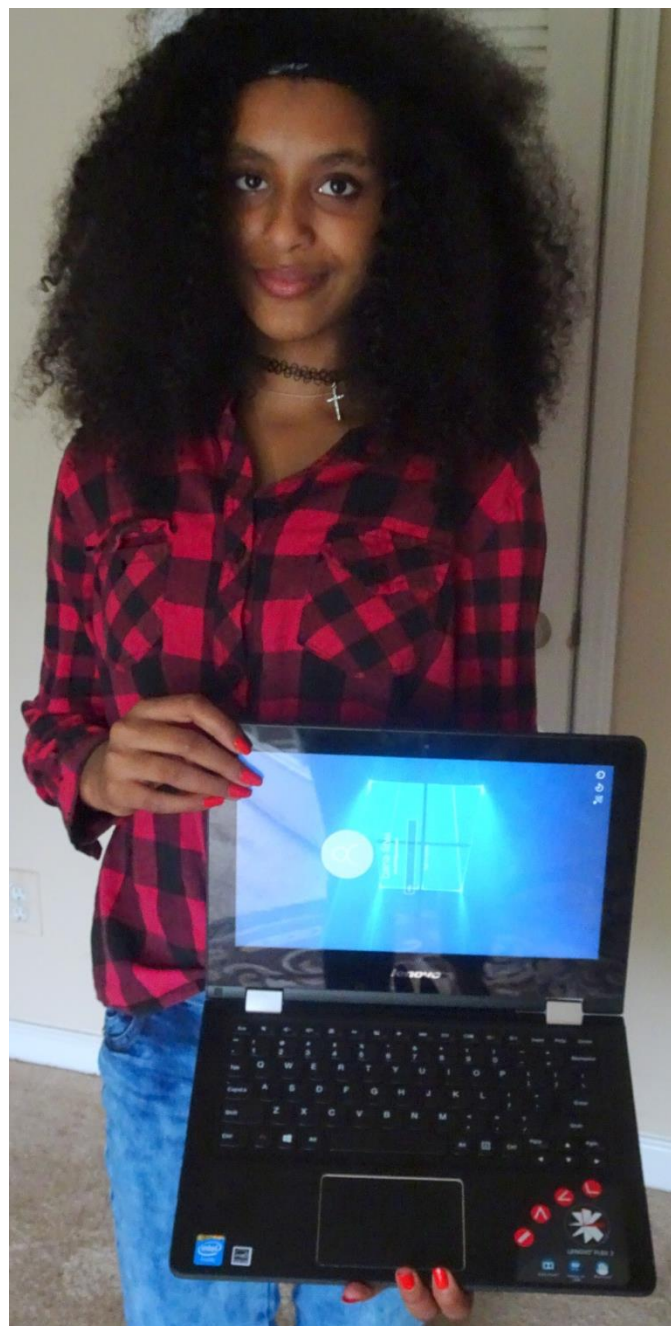
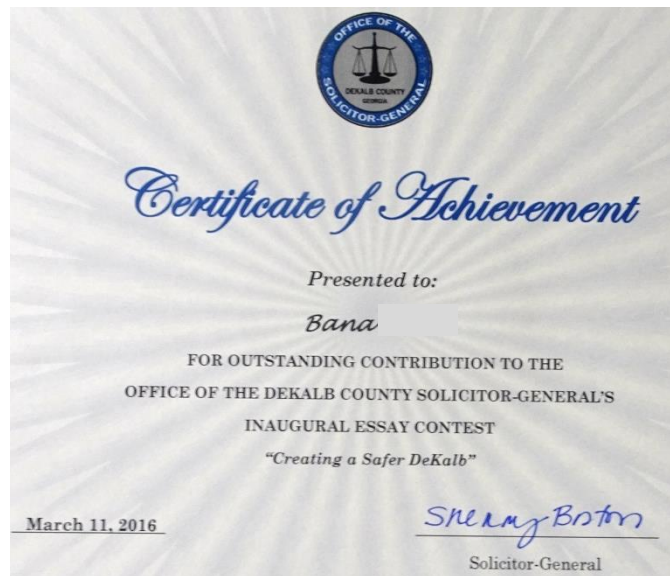
for her because she had three different ideas about how to make Clarkston safer, and I pushed her to talk ABOUT each idea for a paragraph. I kept saying, 'OK, but why? But how? Is that going to work?' and encouraging her to get specific details into her sentences. I think by the end she learned a little bit about how writing works: how you can't just write the same idea over and over for 5 paragraphs; you have to explain and describe your ideas. I was proud of her for doing the hard work of getting her thoughts onto paper and letting me push her to make it better."

"When it came time to go to the gym [for enrichment activities], Bana hadn't finished," Tracy recalls. "She had been quite focused on getting her ideas on paper, so we sat at a table in the corner of the gym while the others played basketball" and continued working together on her essay.

It turns out all that hard work and pushing paid off. Weeks after submitting her essay, Bana's teacher told her she had won the contest. But Bana didn't believe it. "Even American people participated," she said. "I *never* even thought I could win!"

On Friday March 11, Bana was honored as one of five essay winners at the awards ceremony hosted by DeKalb County Solicitor-General Sherry Boston. The winners received certificates from Ms. Boston and U.S. Representative Hank Johnson, as well as brand new laptops! Bana says, "When I saw the laptop I finally believed it was true."

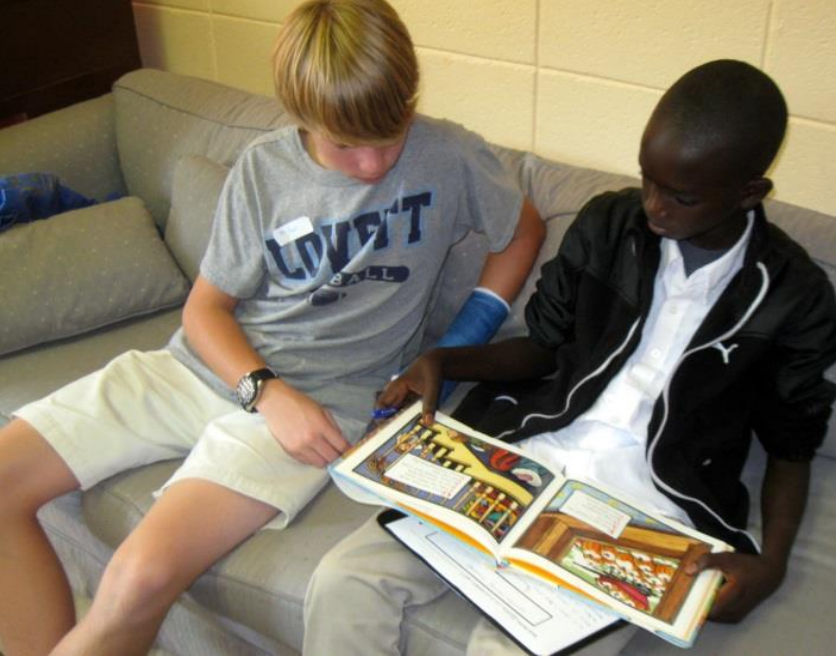

And we're grateful to Tracy and all our volunteers for their dedication and willingness to challenge our students and help them meet their potential.
